A whole community approach to public health could engage the full capacity of the private and nonprofit sectors, local, tribal, state, territorial, and federal governmental partners to create greater alignment that includes, integration and collaboration between policymakers and community leaders and health sectors to improve community health status, reimagine our mental health systems, and build resistance to disease and chronic illness. Through a collaborative partnership, FEMA and CDC have positioned themselves to encourage, support, and build community resilience via social connection while encouraging collective action after an adverse event. Public health's role, with its tradition of whole community strategy, is a vital partner in this process with the skill set, technical expertise, and mission to improve health status. In this discussion, panelists will explore how the U.S. can make a deeper investment in the nation's public health and continuum of care infrastructure.</p>

Julia Ratti, Bailey Bortolin, Ben Challinor, ACTIONN	Housing prices continue to surge across the state, especially in Northern Nevada where the median home price is at \$450,000. Meanwhile, monthly rent prices rise to unaffordable heights, residents in low income apartments are evicted for renovations and demolition, and the unhoused population grows yearly. To make matters worse, COVID-19 and high rates of unemployment have led more people to housing insecurity. Legislators and community organizations are dedicated to addressing housing policy in Nevada by taking a close look at our housing laws, including eviction policies, tenant/landlord agreements, and development strategy. This panel will address some of the

			solutions at the legislature and also look at how COVID-19 has affected housing access in the state.
